Restricting Mandatory HIV Testing Resolution:

WHEREAS:

HIV testing is currently mandated for blood and organ donors, federal prisoners, immigration/refugees, military personnel, and inductees; and

WHEREAS:

bills before the Arizona legislature during the past two sessions have attempted to extend mandatory testing to populations where the risk has not been documented; and

WHEREAS:

the American Medical Association, Centers for Disease Control, and the Surgeon General have expressed opposition to widespread mandatory testing for low risk populations; and

WHEREAS:

mandatory testing programs will divert funds from preventive efforts to combat the spread of HIV.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

The Arizona Public Health Association does not support mandatory HIV testing:

- for any population in Arizona without first determining the prevalence of HIV infection in that population;
- 2. when state sero-prevalence data does not warrant mandatory testing established by national standards:
- 3. when specific plans and resources for the provision of accompanying counseling and education have not been developed;
- for those who have been exposed through casual contact;
- 5. when specific procedures for protecting confidentiality of HIV test results are not in place.
